Our priorities are guided by the Phase Two & Three Reopening of the historic district to visitation. We are prioritizing buildings and landscape features that will be utilized by our visitors during these phases. The Fresh Coat Initiative is providing us a solid matrix within which we can better sequence, restore, and rehabilitate buildings and features in the district.



(Left to right) The public stair that runs from Main Street down to the plaza in front of Salem Stitches and Muddy Creek Café had been closed due to rot (a public safety hazard). In preparation for our Phase Two Reopening, we have restored the stair based on its original design. This stair is particularly important as Muddy Creek Café and Salem Stitches will be reopening in Phase Two. This restoration work was primarily completed by craftsmen Ben Masterson, with the logistical assistance of Blake Stevenson, craftsman, Erik Skarzynski, Director of Facilities, and Tony Bragg, Facilities Associate









(Left to right) The orthwestern corner of the Fourth House was in need of considerable repair. Due to poor water drainage at the rear stair, an entire wood joint had rotted away from the sill timber. . . A dutchman repair was utilized to seamlessly patch the compromised joint. The handrail had also dislodged from the building and was failing. Each step of the restoration can be seen in thesephotographs. The final restoration is pictured below. This repair was primarily completed by joiner Ben Masterson with assistance from craftsman Blake Stevenson and the logistical assistance of Erik Skarzynski, Director of Facilities and Tony Bragg, Facilities Associate.
